These 3 elements are the master plan to a growing community. Tourism is one of the keys to attract visitors, that may decided to work and live in the community.

The Journey of Webb and Hannah Harwood

In 1789, Webb and Hannah Harwood embarked on a journey from Adams, Massachusetts, in search of a better life. They traversed challenging terrain and eventually settled in the western portion of Palmyra. Their decision to leave their previous home was driven by the promise of rich soil, ideal for farming, which provided ample work opportunities. Their ancestors, friends, and neighbors soon followed, drawn by the same prospects of a fruitful life.

The Formation of Macedon

In 1823, as part of an effort to balance the towns within Wayne County (then part of Ontario County), the town of Macedon was formed from a portion of Palmyra. The fertile land and the growing community made it an attractive place for settlers.

Community Development and Education

As more families settled in Macedon, schools and academies were established, providing education and recreational opportunities for the children. This development fostered a sense of community and supported the notion of living, working, and playing in the same area, which was essential for economic growth.

Today, the town of Macedon boasts a wide range of amenities that enhance the quality of life for its residents. These include:

Historical Significance

Rounding out the cultural experiences are two historic buildings located in Macedon Center, both founded by the Quakers. The historic Macedon Academy, built in 1853, is particularly noteworthy. Interestingly, classes initially began in 1841 in a tavern near the current academy's location. It holds the history of Macedon. You will find a museum and a research area. Looking Back - Macedon and the Erie Canal

What's in a name? On older maps you'll see the names Macedon Locks, Lockville and Macedonville directly linking our community of Macedon to the Erie Canal. This year will be the 200th anniversary of the Erie Canal. Like these names, Macedon has gone through many changes these past 200 years. Officially founded in 1823, Macedon preceded the official opening of the Erie Canal by three years.



Transportation was essential to the growth of any community. Now we frequently

see trucks of all types traveling Route 31 and trains north of the canal heading east and west through town. Routes 350, 8 and 28 headed north and south serving the same purposes.

The Erie Canal, at times known as "Clinton's Ditch" or "Clinton's Folly," named after Governor Dewitt Clinton quickly brought local businesses a new way to transport and receive goods. It also became a convenient way to travel. The cost of transporting goods decreased from a high of \$125/ton of cargo between Buffalo and New York City to \$4 per ton in 1835. Traffic became so busy that an enlargement was begun soon after it had opened. Macedon benefitted from this enlargement.

Building the canal was not easy. Most of the work was done by hand. "The project provided practical schooling for a new generation of American engineers and builders, and led to the founding of the nation's first civil

engineering school, Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute (RPI) in Troy, New York, in 1824.

Erie Canal engineers devised new equipment to uproot trees and stumps and developed a cement that could set and harden

underwater." https://www.history.com/topics/ landmarks/erie-canal The men that helped to build the canal, some Irish immigrants, took eight years to finish the project. Several of these workers didn't survive and are buried at the Wayneport Rd. Cemetery.

The original canal was 4' deep and 40' wide. Boats and barges were pulled by mules/horses on towpaths. The second Erie Canal, begun in

1836, was referred to as the Enlarged Canal. It was enlarged from four feet to seven feet deep and from 40 to 70 feet wide. <u>https://considerthesourceny.org/using-primary-sources/erie-canal-time-machine</u>

Completed in 1864 the "Enlarged Canal" was intended to improve and straighten the canal, to allow for increased traffic. One of the improvements was the

creation of double locks. The canal was very busy and it became necessary to create areas where the locks could allow people to travel both east and west at the same time. Macedon became home to two sets of double locks 60 and 61. Lock 60 is located along Quaker Road between O'Neil and Walworth Roads. The remains of this lock are maintained as a historic site and presents an excellent opportunity to study the construction of a lock built from stone. It can be accessed from the trail head on the north side of the O'Neil Rd bridge. <u>https://waynehistorians.org/</u> <u>Places/site.php?site=973</u>

The Barge Canal: The first shovel- full of dirt was dug in 1905, and improvements were completed on May 15, 1918. Approximately 340 miles in length, the canal is 12 feet deep and 120 feet wide. By this time, steam shovels were in use. This improved the speed in which the construction could be completed. The canal is officially called the New York State Canal System. It includes the original Erie Canal along with the Champlain, Oswego and Cayuga-Seneca canals.
